Samantha Gedeon: 2024 LeBow Commencement Speaker

As a first-generation Haitian American, Samantha Gedeon '24 worried about being "detached from her community" when moving from a large, diverse public high school in Brockton, Massachusetts, to a predominantly white institution like Drexel. She found her way to existing communities of support, particularly through LeBow BRIDGE, and assembled others for herself throughout her years on campus. Her experiences shaped her time at Drexel and provided material for her address to the LeBow Class of 2024 as their Commencement speaker.

Olympic Legend Jackie Joyner-Kersee

Jackie Joyner-Kersee is widely considered to be one of the greatest women athletes of all time. But despite having won three gold, one silver and two bronze Olympic medals, the proudest moment of her career was graduating from college, she shared during a visit to Drexel on Oct. 30. Joyner-Kersee joined a group of Drexel students from the BRIDGE programs in the College of Arts and Sciences, LeBow College of Business and Westphal College of Media Arts and Design for an intimate conversation about her inspiring life and career.

Cultural Immersion Spring Break Trip

Students immersed themselves in the corporate world and connected with Drexel alumni during a spring break experience in Chicago. Beyond seeing the offices, these visits provided the opportunity for students to envision themselves as future leaders in these dynamic organizations and industries.

Highlights from the trip included insightful conversations with leaders at CFI Partners (Levoyd Robinson), a firsthand look at the company's work culture at Deloitte (Derreck Robinson '93), insights into the strategies behind one of the world's leading brands at PepsiCo and the opportunity to learn about consumer protection at the Federal Trade Commission (Roberto Menjivar '03).

Students had the chance to hear from Drexel alumni and learn more about their career paths during a networking reception at the Museum of Illusions, hosted by David Stec '03, highlighting the enduring impact of the BRIDGE community.

Additionally, students engaged in civic service with the Greater Chicago Food Depository and visited Mindworks: The Science of Thinking Museum which sparked students' curiosity and passion for learning. The trip provided an amazing opportunity for intellectual growth and personal reflection.

Annual Saturday Sit-In

Our Annual Saturday-Sit is a conference-style day where we provide our scholars and other Drexel undergraduate students the opportunity to participate in various workshops. This year we focused on financial literacy with "Money Talks: Pathways to Financial Literacy," where students unlocked the secrets to financial success. With more than 130 in attendance, workshops were presented by various BRIDGE scholars, BRIDGE alumni and LeBow alumni. Highlighted topics included: "Investing 101: Navigating Your Financial Future" presented by BRIDGE alumni Jay Daniel '23 and Alwyn Taylor '23, "Mindful Money" presented by BRIDGE alum Ariana Schofield '16, "Got the Offer ... Now What?" presented by LeBow alum Randy Holmes '70, and many more.

Wellness in our Minds

DRAGONZEN: A WELLNESS JOURNEY

Last winter we piloted "DragonZen: A Wellness Journey," a course for first-year BRIDGE scholars focused on the wellness dimensions. This course had a significant impact, equipping students with critical skills for both personal and academic success. Through self-reflection, goal setting and self-care strategies, students learned to assess and improve their wellness habits, understand the impact of cultural, social and economic factors, and connect wellness to academic performance.

BUILDING BRIDGES MIDDLE SCHOOL CAMP

The Building BRIDGE(s) camp focused on wellness for the second year in a row. Focusing on the Wellness Wheel model, the program ran over a week, highlighting some

of the key components of the wellness wheel dimensions: physical, emotional, social and financial wellness. Camp participants had the opportunity to participate in a selfdefense and social media safety workshop hosted by Drexel Police, visit the Franklin Institute and participate in civic engagement by visiting Urban Tree Connection, a community garden in West Philadelphia.

This year, LeBow BRIDGE made a meaningful impact on the West Philadelphia community, upholding our civic engagement pillar through various service initiatives. Participants engaged in civic engagement activities, contributed to the Dimplez 4 Dayz organization, supported the Philly Abundance Food Drive and helped revitalize the Norman Butch Ellis Playground. These efforts reflect LeBow BRIDGE's commitment to giving back and fostering a spirit of service among its members, positively impacting the local community and reinforcing the importance of civic responsibility.

Levoyd Robinson Information Session CFI: Fireside Chat

Levoyd Robinson engaged with our LeBow Bridge students in an insightful fireside chat. During the session, Levoyd shared his journey to becoming CEO/CIO for CFI Partners and offered invaluable advice on navigating the world of finance. His discussion highlighted the vast opportunities available to students in the financial sector, inspiring them to explore diverse career paths and set ambitious goals. Levoyd expertise and personal experiences left a lasting impact, empowering our students to pursue their aspirations with confidence.
